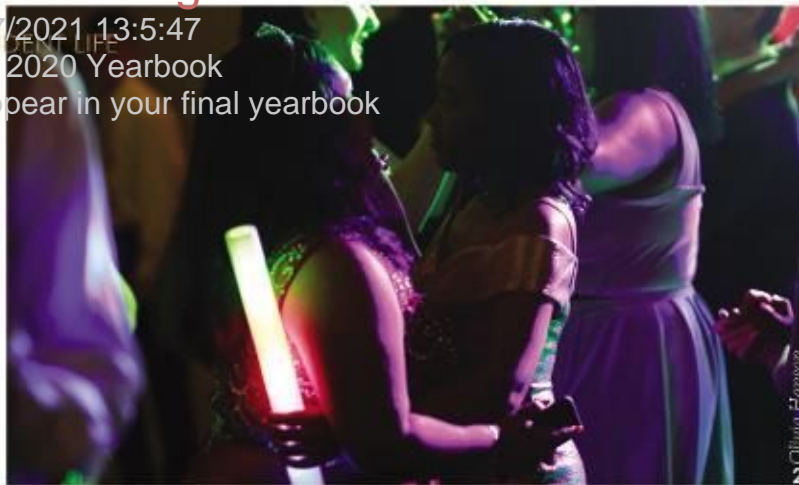

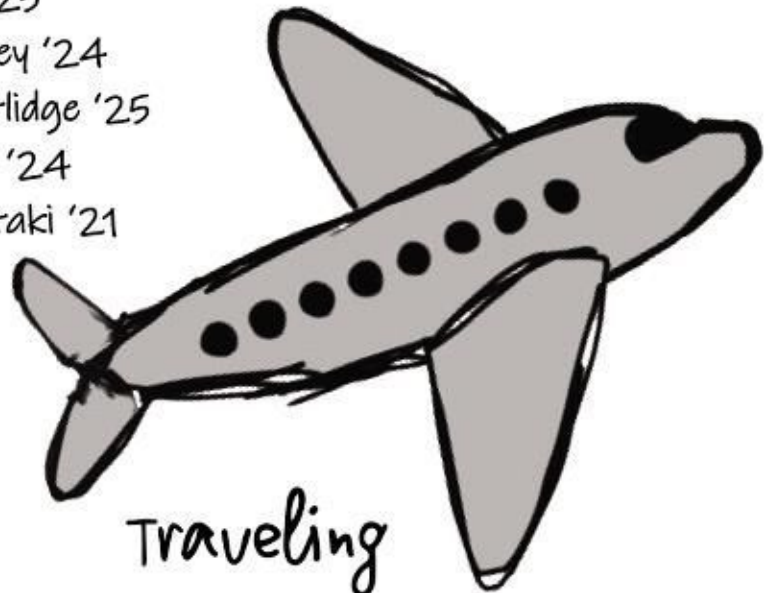

1. Josh Kannen '22 places a small amount of metal, coated onto an iron nail, into the Bunsen burner. He was able to correctly identify the metal as copper based on the strong green color of the flame.

2. Nicole Wilson '22 and Jade Modica '22 soak an iron wire in a metal condensate, preparing it for identification through observing the color of its flame. 3. Pedro Garcia Robles '21 examines his iron nail after pounding it flat with the supervision of Dr. McPhee.

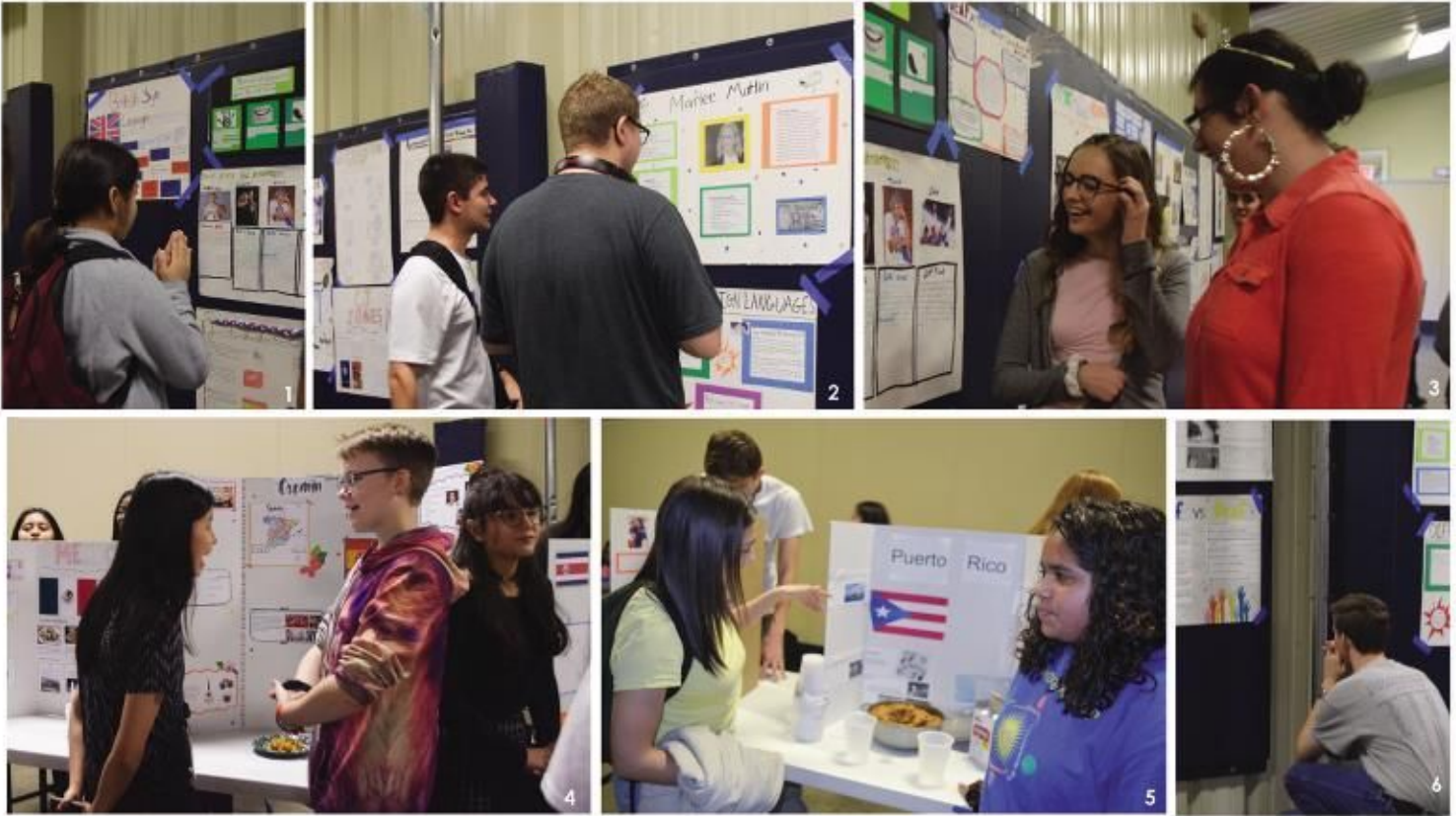

I think Ms. Z almost fainted. I was so shocked I couldn't process it at first. Then he called the last name and everyone was shouting and it all came in a wave. Then Ayla got her nomination and the same thing happened all over again. It was the best day, and I'm so glad I got to have that experience with my class.

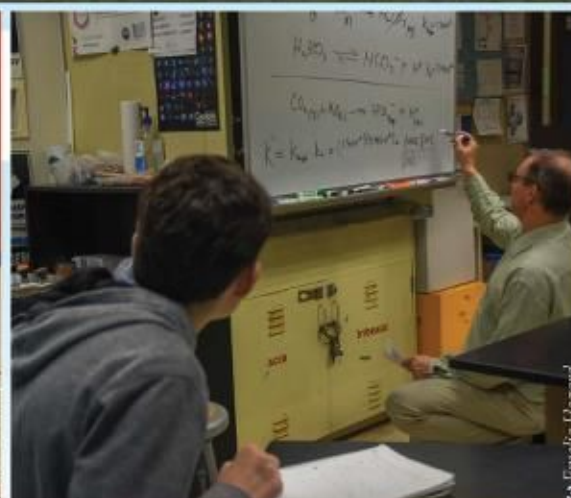

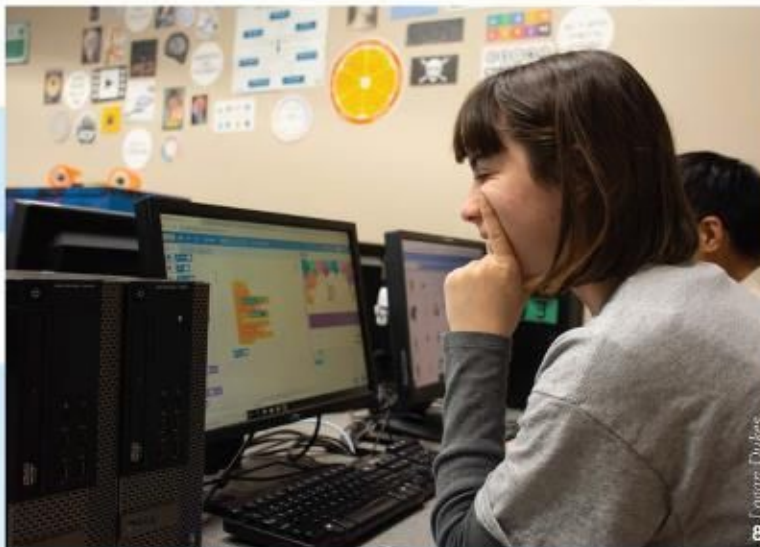


The Middle-school Science Olympiad team has had a great year so far. They placed third at their regional competition in San Antonio, so there is a strong possibility that they will make it to the state competition.

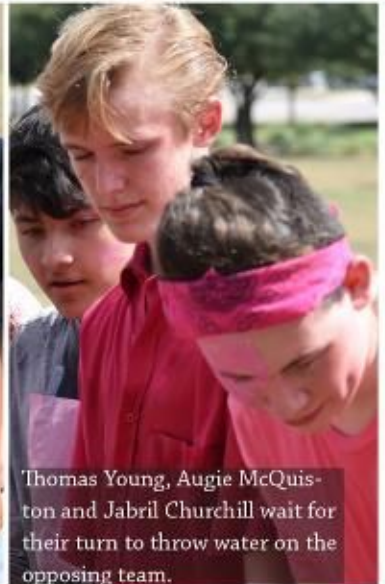

PRODUCTION

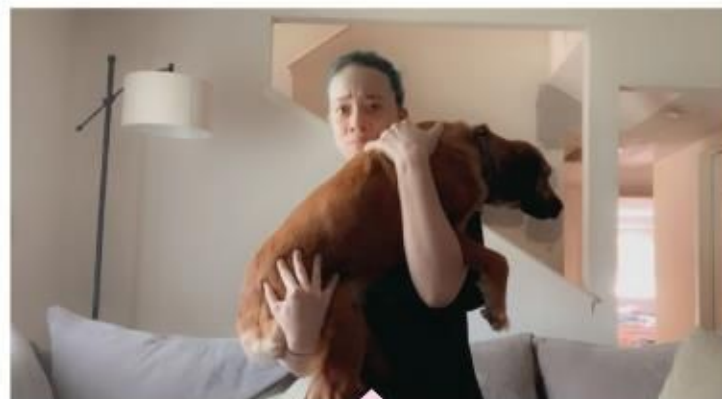
